Calynn Dowler is a cultural anthropologist specializing in South Asia. Her research explores ecological cosmologies and socio-environmental change in the Sundarbans of West Bengal, India. Her current book project, *Undercurrents: Water Cosmologies and Ethics in India's Sundarbans Delta*, traces how a multi-faith community of Hindus, Muslims, and Christians sustain and transform spiritual relationships with water and the deltaic environment amid capital-intensive development, religious reform, and climate change. Her broader research engages questions of multispecies entanglements in contexts of ecological precarity, religion and moral economy, and ritual and performance studies.

Raised in Mumbai and London and educated in Political Science at Delhi University, she later taught Women's Studies at UC Davis before a 1993 head injury reshaped her work toward disability, spirituality, and social justice. Based in Oakland, CA, her recent book *Myriad Intimacies* (Duke University Press, 2022) won the 2023 Nautilus Book Award Silver for Lyric Prose.

Nicolás Grandi

His work spans film, poetry, music, and sculpture, exploring the evolving relationship between images and words while deliberately challenging disciplinary boundaries and conventional narrative forms. With a strong focus on facilitating transcultural dialogue, his artistic practice emphasizes learning that bridges theory, reflexivity, and praxis in collaborative settings. He teaches at UNTREF and directs the Medialab for young artists at Otro Mundo in Argentina.



South Asian Studies Minor Course Spotlight

ANSC 152: Social Justice in South Asia

Learning Democracy Through Lived Experience by Tavishaa Vanjani

This ethnographic interview centers on Tavishaa's grandfather, a retired political science professor who lived through the Partition and spent decades teaching democracy and citizenship. Professor Vermani's story reveals how historical trauma, caste, and political pressure shape who feels safe speaking in classrooms today. Professor Vermani described teaching as a public service, where protecting students' ability to question freely is an act of social justice. The project links personal memory to course themes, showing how education can resist inequality without looking like traditional activism. It reframes democracy as something built daily through mentorship, patience, and the creation of safe spaces for difficult conversations.



Art as an Emotional Infrastructure by Bhavika Ailawadi



This ethnographic interview centers on Kamiya Dargan, an art therapist and founder of MyPerch, whose work engages the urban poor navigating trauma, inequality, and emotional precarity. Dargan's account reveals how structural violence shapes whose emotions are heard, suppressed, or rendered invisible in educational and NGO spaces. She frames art-making not as enrichment, but as emotional infrastructure: a necessary language through which participants process grief, anger, and confusion when verbal expression is unsafe or unavailable. The project links personal narratives and observed artwork to broader theories of gendered emotional labor and embodied trauma. The interview demonstrates how collective art practices create temporary but meaningful spaces of safety, allowing marginalized individuals to reclaim emotional agency without overt political protest. Ultimately, the project reframes social justice as everyday, relational work—built through listening, patience, and the cultivation of environments where healing can begin quietly, through color, form, and shared presence.

Animal Cultures, Under Rising Threat, Are Key To Species Survival, argues Dr. Shermin de Silva

“A changing world doesn’t just erase existing cultures: it creates new ones. As the Arctic continues to warm, hungry polar bears are digging muzzle-deep into garbage dumps instead of hunting seals on sea ice—an increasingly common behavior that’s problematic for both bears and humans. When we think of dumpster-diving, the word culture may not come up, Dr. de Silva explained. “But that’s what’s going on.”

We’ve long assumed animals are born knowing what to eat and where to go, de Silva pointed out—but that’s simply not true. “It’s helpful to think about culture as this alternative inheritance mechanism,” she said... Yet conservation policies, for the most part, have been slow to reflect this understanding. They “usually tend to be crafted around numbers,” de Silva said. And that’s no longer enough. Culture, once considered rare and confined to a select few, is emerging as widespread—and, for some in the animal kingdom, foundational.

Dr. Shermin de Silva is an Assistant Professor of Ecology, Behavior and Evolution. She is a biologist and conservation scientist with close to 20 years of experience primarily focused on the behavior, ecology and conservation of Asian elephants as Director of the Udawalawe Elephant Research Project in Sri Lanka.

South Asian Studies Council: Postdoctoral Associate in South Asian Studies, 2026-27

The South Asian Studies Council at the MacMillan Center invites applications for a Postdoctoral Associate position at Yale University for the 2026-2027 academic year. Candidates must have research and teaching experience relevant to modern and contemporary South Asia, in the humanities or social sciences.

The salary for this position is commensurate with experience and complies with the Yale Office of Postdoctoral Affairs compensation policy and includes a benefits package. We will accept applications immediately with review beginning on February 15, 2026 and continuing until the selections are final.

Qualifications

All applicants must have completed their PhD by the time of appointment. The PhD must be awarded between 2022 and the time of the appointment. Graduate students who are working on their PhDs may apply but must present proof of having completed and filed their dissertations, even if awaiting formal conferral of the PhD degree.

Fluency in English is required, as is in-depth knowledge of at least one South Asian language. During the two semesters of this appointment, the Postdoctoral Associate will teach one course related to their interests per semester, pursue their own research, and participate in the activities of the South Asian Studies Council. Selected Postdoctoral Associates are expected to be in residence in New Haven, Connecticut for the full duration of the appointment to take an active part in the intellectual exchange with other members of the Council and the MacMillan Center.

Application Instructions

Applicants should submit a cover letter; a one-page description of research plans; a draft of a course syllabus and a title and brief summary of a second course; and a CV. Letters of reference are not required at this initial stage but will be requested later.


