MEERA MAHADEVAN, ASSISTANT PROFESSOR OF ECONOMICS

Meera Mahadevan is an Assistant Professor at the School of Global Policy and Strategy. Her research examines how political and institutional barriers shape the provision of energy and resources, focusing on issues such as clean energy adoption, infrastructure quality, and the economic impacts of resource allocation. Through a blend of empirical and experimental approaches, her work seeks to inform policies that promote equitable and sustainable development. She is also affiliated with the Center for Effective Global Action (CEGA) and J-PAL's King Climate Action Initiative. Meera holds a PhD in Economics from the University of Michigan and has published in journals such as the *American Economic Review* and the *Journal of Public Economics*.



AMRITA DHAR, ASSISTANT PROFESSOR OF ENGLISH & COMPARITIVE LITERATURE

Amrita Dhar is an Assistant Professor of English and Comparative Literature, specializing in early modern studies, disability studies, and postcolonial studies. Her research spans topics like John Milton's blind poetics, premodern critical race studies, and mountaineering social histories, supported by grants from institutions such as the National Endowment for the Humanities. She is completing her first monograph, *Milton's Blind Language and Disability Poetics*, and directs the Shakespeare in the "Post"Colonies project, which includes a website, podcast, and two upcoming publications: an Arden Shakespeare volume and a journal special issue. An avid climber, she also writes on global mountaineering literatures.



NIYATI SHENOY, LECTURER, HUMANITIES (REVELLE COLLEGE)

Niyati Shenoy is a Lecturer in Humanities at Revelle College. She earned her PhD in Middle Eastern, South Asian and African Studies at Columbia University, where she researched rape and the politics of public space in early colonial north India. Her teaching and research interests include social and legal history, South Asia and the Indian Ocean, historical anthropology, transnational queer and feminist political theory, and caste studies.

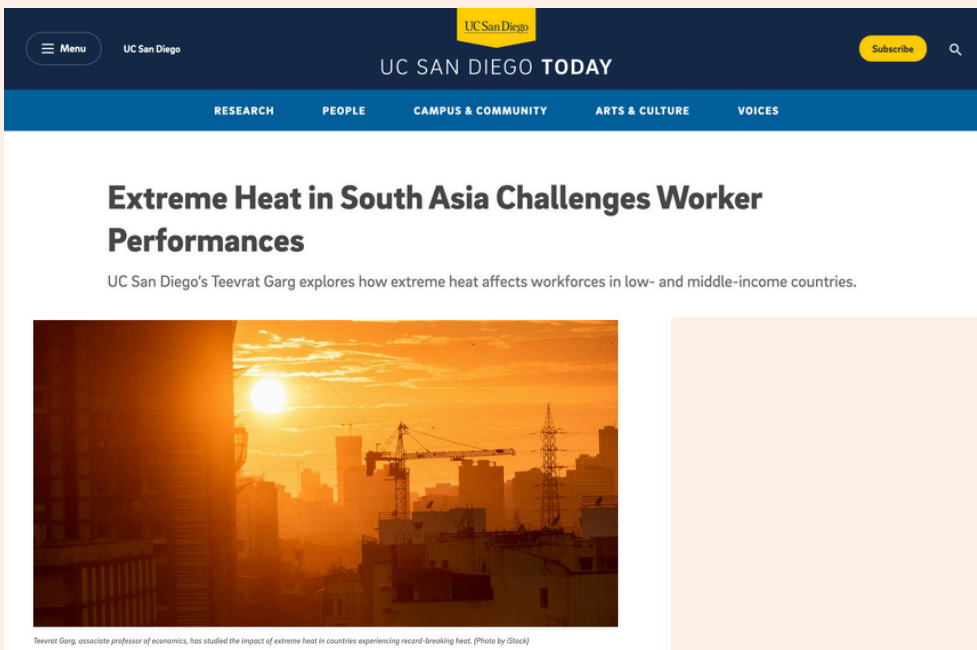

PROFESSOR TEEVRAT GARG EXPLORES HOW EXTREME HEAT IMPACTS WORKER PRODUCTIVITY IN SOUTH ASIA

AIIS DIGITAL SCHOLARSHIP GRANTS

The American Institute of Indian Studies is pleased to invite proposals for its Digital India Learning (DIL) initiative that demonstrate a sustained use of digital methodology and resources in the exploration of a research topic focused on India.

AIIS welcomes projects at all stages of development, including pilots at a preliminary stage of conception that: foster the digital production and dissemination of knowledge about India; promote the creation and use of digital resources and media for the study of India; promote digital collaboration across disciplines including, and especially, between the humanities, social sciences, and STEM fields.

The application should include:

- a) a proposal
- b) a budget
- c) a coversheet
- d) a two-page CV for each principal investigator

Submit applications as a single pdf by email to aiis@uchicago.edu.

Evaluation of the proposal will be based on potential impact on specific fields of research, on technical innovation and feasibility, on sustainability and data management plans, and plans for open access of deliverables in the spirit of digital/public scholarship.

Decisions will be made by March 1, 2025. Those selected will be able to carry out their projects on a schedule of their choosing from May 1, 2025 to April 30, 2026.

FEES AND FINANCIAL AID

- Program fee: \$8,000 plus airfare
- AIIS offers a number of fellowships, funded by the U.S. Department of Education, to be awarded on a competitive basis (NOT available for Sanskrit).
- These fellowships include all program fees, round-trip airfare to India and a maintenance allowance to cover living expenses.
- Those eligible for fellowships include U.S. citizens and permanent residents with two years prior language study; other students would need to fund their own participation.

The South Asian Studies Council at the MacMillan Center invites applications for a Postdoctoral Associate position at Yale University for the 2025-2026 academic year. Candidates must have research and teaching experience relevant to modern and contemporary South Asia, in the humanities or social sciences.

During the two semesters of this appointment, the Postdoctoral Associate will teach one course related to their interests per semester, pursue their own research, and participate in the activities of the South Asian Studies Council. Selected Postdoctoral Associates are expected to be in residence in New Haven, Connecticut for the full duration of the appointment to take an active part in the intellectual exchange with other members of the Program and the MacMillan Center.

The salary for this position is commensurate with experience and complies with the Yale Office of Postdoctoral Affairs [compensation policy](#) and includes a [benefits package](#).

Qualifications

All applicants must have completed their PhD by the time of appointment. Graduate students who are working on their PhDs may apply but must present proof of having completed and filed their dissertations, even if awaiting formal conferral of the PhD degree. Fluency in English is required, as is in-depth knowledge of at least one South Asian language.

Application Instructions

Applicants should submit a cover letter; a one-page description of research plans; a draft of a course syllabus and a title and brief summary of a second course; and a CV. Letters of reference are not required at this initial stage but will be requested later.

We will accept applications immediately with review beginning on February 15, 2025 and continuing until the selections are final.
